Nicholls State University's online history bachelor's was ranked in the top 10 by collegesrank.com. Nicholls ranked No. 8 out of the 25 schools selected and second in Louisiana. To create the rankings, the website considered degree investment return, student and alumni evaluation, cost value, matriculation and academic success.



The Pingyao International Photography Festival is an annual event in Pingyao, China. Pingyao is a 2,700-year-old ancient walled city and a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Advocating diversity, internationalism and professionalism, the festival attracts about 100,000 visitors. It is an important stage for photographers from around the world.
