MACO HOSTS SOUTHEAST JOURNALISM CONFERENCE



DEPARTMENT OF MASS COMMUNICATION — Nicholls State University's Department of Mass Communication, in collaboration with Southeastern University, hosted the Southeast Journalism Conference (SEJC) for the first time. In addition to outside guest speakers brought in to present various topics in journalism, three Nicholls MACO professors (Assistant Professor Nicki Boudreaux, Assistant Professor Lance Arnold, and Assistant Professor Laure Kasovich) held sessions on special topics such as student media leadership, using drone footage in the news industry, and why multimedia stories are important. Nicholls students were also able to compete in on-site competitions to show off their skills and knowledge, where KNSU-TV brought home the 8th best award for Best TV Newscast and KNSU 91.5 FM won 3rd best radio station and 7th best audio program.

The SEJC keynote speaker, **Greg Gruenig**, is a Nicholls 2013 graduate turned KLFY news anchor and social media star of his segment titled "Acadiana Eats", where he highlights Acadiana restaurants. Mass Communication Dept. Head Dr. **James Stewart** said, "Having Gerald as the keynote speaker gave the students an opportunity to hear from someone who is engaged in social media as well as traditional



Cox took material from her teaching collection as examples of post-Civil War memorial culture.



Emmanuel Macron spoke of the importance of Louisiana's French language. This was the first French president to visit Louisiana in 50 years.

DEPARTMENT OF ART – Marjan Khatibi, Assistant Professor of Art, hosted a Zoom event on Virtual Reality (VR) opportunities with guest speaker, "Thomas Winkley", a Technical Marketing Advocate - Education from Unity. He discussed several key topics related to VR, including: how we build VR apps, what jobs are available in the world of VR, and how we can use VR to drive cool stories/experiences. The one-



hour event was open to all faculty and students interested in learning more about VR and opportunities in research and education from an industry expert.





DEPARTMENT OF MASS COMMUNICATION - The writing duo of family members, **Ken Wells** and **Hillary Wells**, who are both Nicholls alumni, launched their new book "Swamped!" in Mary and Al Danos Theater in March. The book is the first collaboration between Ken Wells and Hillary Wells. Released by Koehler Books in January, the book is an adventure tale of two wildly different teens flung together amid dire circumstances.

Ken, a Bayou Black native, was a Pulitzer Prize finalist as a reporter and served as editor on two Pulitzer-Prize winning projects for The Wall Street Journal. He has also written six novels and two books of narrative nonfiction. One, "The Good Pirates of the Forgotten Bayous,"

focusing on post-Katrina South Louisiana, received the Harry Chapin book award.

Hillary, a 2012 Mass Communication graduate from Nicholls and Ken's niece, is a writer, comedian, and producer. Hillary said she was drawn to the project working with her uncle by the opportunity to help him develop a strong female character.

A CELEBRATION OF THE NEGRO SPIRITUALS

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC – Dr. **Valerie Francis**, Associate Professor of Music, gathered some of the most talented, brilliant vocalists and musicians across campus and state lines for the 13th annual "A Celebration of the Negro Spirituals." The event held in the Mary M. Danos Theater was "an amazing experience of Spirit and Soul." Farren Clark shared this quote by Langston Hughes: "Spirituals sing of woe triumphantly, knowing well that all rivers will be crossed and the Promised Land is just beyond the stream. The Spirituals ask no pity, for their words ride on the strongest melodies, the melody of faith. That is why there is joy in their singing, peace in their music and strength in their soul."







AWARD WINNING BLUES ARTIST PERFORMS AT NICHOLLS

DEPARTMENT OF MASS COMMUNICATION — Grammy-winning blues artist Chris Thomas King presented "Rhythm of Resistance" in the Mary and Al Danos Theater as part of the university's Black History Month activities. King, a Baton Rouge native, has sold more than 10 million records in the United States and appeared as guitar legend Tommy Johnson in the 2000 film "O Brother, Where Art Thou?" He discussed his book "The Blues: The Authentic Narrative of my Music and Culture," which tells the story of how the blues began as a cosmopolitan art form in New Orleans in the late 19th century before spreading globally. The event was sponsored by the university's speech faculty, in association with the Department of Mass Communication, the Nicholls Players, and the Nicholls Black History Month Committee.

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ART PROFESSORS MAKE PRESENTATIONS ON DISCIPLINE SPECIFIC FRESHMAN ORIENTATION & MENTOR PROGRAMS

DEPARTMENT OF ART – Dr. **Ashley Busby**, Assistant Professor of Art History, and **Trisha Rabalais**, Professor of Art, provided a conference presentation entitled "Building a Community of Table People: Creating Internal and External Connections for Students" at the fifth annual Sparking Success Faculty Development Conference sponsored by CELT (Center for Engaged Learning and Teaching) at Tulane University. They noted their work, "has included the development of a department specific freshman orientation program (Fresh Start), designed and led by upper-level students; the creation of a freshman mentor program,





known as Co-Arts; and the creation of a digital tool, the Life RAFT, which helps students navigate university and departmental policies and requirements and creates a space for virtual community building."



Additionally, before going to Tulane, Dr. Busby and Ms. Rabalais delivered a related talk entitled "Life Rafts: Building a Resource for Student Success" at GIFTS (Great Ideas for Teaching Students) sponsored by the Nicholls Center for Teaching Excellence. Of the experiences, they reported enjoying the opportunities, "to share art department initiatives and strategies with various campus and regional audiences and discuss ways that we can better meet the needs of our students and create a sense of inclusive, departmental community."

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SCIENCES — Nicholls University's sociology department hosted a social work panel in March for Social Work Month. The panel was held in the Bollinger Suites and featured social workers from around the region to

Mr. Castleman is currently on faculty at the University of Miami, and perhaps the world's most active performer/pedagogue on the violin. He has been soloist with the orchestras of Philadelphia, Boston, Brisbane, Chicago, Hong Kong, Moscow, Mexico City, New York, San Francisco, Seoul, and Shanghai.

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC – Assistant Professor, Dr. Jason S. Ladd performed a recital in Danos Theater that included the premier of his composition "Frigid Sky." He collaborated with current Music faculty Assistant Professor, Dr. Yian-Shan Su on piano and Assistant Professor, Dr.



Gustavo Miranda on timpani as well as former Nicholls adjunct Ms. **Casie Forbes** on tuba. The music included works spanning from the 1700s until today.


of art, photography, fashion, design, music, and fame in the celebrated director's work—in cinema and beyond.








As a professional historian, Dr. Theriot has authored numerous publications, including American Energy, Imperiled Coast: Oil and Gas Development in Louisiana's Wetlands and Great Game Paradise: A History of Vermilion Corporation and a history of Cenac Towing Company. This lecture is free and open to the public.





DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC - **Dr. Luciana Soares**, Gloria B. Callais Endowed Professor of Music was the principal investigator of a fully funded grant from the Board of Regents in the amount of \$17,073. This grant will fund a replacement of the current projector in the Piano Lab with a 86" interactive TV and control keypad. DEPARTMENT OF ART — Dr. Deborah Cibelli, Professor of Art, presented an art history paper at the Renaissance Society of America's Virtual Conference, hosted by Fordham Univ. in

New York City. The scholarship focused on Francesco Salviati's use of river gods as emblems in a fresco painted in the 1540s when the Palazzo Vecchio of Florence was being transformed into a ducal residence. The editors of Iconocrazia, an international online journal published by the University of Bari in Italy, have accepted the paper for publication in 2023. Dr. Cibelli noted, "the research for this project has allowed me to consider the relationship between art and literature. I appreciated the opportunity to present the material in a session with a speaker from Italy and to have the presentation available to RSA members through January 2023."





DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY & GEOGRAPHY — Dr. Spencer McBride from the Joseph Smith Papers was a special guest for Dr. Stuart Tully's HIST 490: History of Christianity in the United States.

Students learned about early LDS history and the current work of the Papers in documenting Smith's life. Dr. McBride also took questions from the students regarding historical research, as well as Mormon history and culture.

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
ENGLISH PROFESSOR HAS TWO RECENT PUBLICATIONS

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH, MODERN LANGUAGES, & CULTURAL STUDIES – Dr. Michael S. Martin, Associate Professor of English, wrote an essay, "'Little Porcelain Shepherds and Shepherdesses': The Female Pastoral Archetype and Versions of the Pastoral," that has just been published in the collection Appalachian Ecocriticism and the Paradox of Place, produced by the University of Georgia Press. Additionally, Dr. Martin's review of Michael Colacurcio's book, Hawthorne's Histories, Hawthorne's World: From Salem to Somewhere Else, just appeared in the



newest issue of The Nathaniel Hawthorne Review published by Penn State University Press. The scholarly publication collective publishes submitted essays and other literary pieces related to Hawthorne's life and works.

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC – Nicholls Choirs, in collaboration with the Student Culinary Association of the Chef John Folse Culinary Institute, presented Love Notes in the Nicholls Cotillion Ballroom. Attendees enjoyed "a musical evening celebrating romance" which included an exquisite 4-course sit-down dinner with live music by a jazz trio and the Nicholls State University Tour Choir. This event helped raise funds for choir members to sing abroad in Ireland in May of 2023. Dr. **John St. Marie** will be traveling with the group.





DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY & GEOGRAPHY – On March 17th Ms. Ashlyn Sutton, Assistant Professor Dr. Shae Cox, and Assistant Professor Dr. Kevin McQueeney presented their research over Smith Ridge at the Louisiana Historical Association Conference. Their roundtable discussed the history and critical needs of a historically Black community in Terrebonne Parish. They are continuing their research with the assistance of the Coastal Protection and Restoration Authorit Grant.



DEPARTMENT OF MASS COMMUNICATION —The Nicholls Players presented "The Memo," by Václav Havel, directed by Assistant Professor Dr. Anna Broussard, in the Danos Theater on March 23rd - 26th. The play is an absurdist comedy originally written in what was then Czechoslovakia in 1965, that parodies bureaucracy and conformity.



DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC – Assistant Professor, Dr. Taylor Assad and her saxophone quartet, Quartetto Obrigado, along with grammy award-winning saxophonist Branford Marsalis premiered new works during a recital on March 31, 2023 at the Biennial North American Saxophone Alliance Conference, held at The University of Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg. This international conference is held every two years and features the world's leading experts on saxophone research, performance, and pedagogy.





DEPARTMENT OF ART – Dr. **Deborah Cibelli**, Professor of Art, chaired a virtual session of art history presentations on Symbolist art at the 111th Annual CAA Conference held online and in New York City. The session entitled "The Symbolist Imagination" explored the relationship between the visual arts and theater. Liesbeth Grotenhuis, a teacher, curator, and scholar affiliated with Minerva, School of Arts and Design in the Netherlands, discussed art by and about the actress Sarah Bernhardt. Dr. Rosina Neginsky from the University of Illinois examined the role of theater in the career of the Russian artist Mikhail Vrubel. "Working with these scholars," Dr. Cibelli notes, "has been a way in which to explore the imaginative use of multimedia for expression."



DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH, MODERN LANGUAGES, & CULTURAL STUDIES — Professor Richmond Eustis received recognition from the director of the Fulbright U.S. Scholar Program on behalf of the



Institute of International Education, for his expertise and service on their peer review committee for the 2023-2024 competition. The Fulbright Scholar Program is hosted by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA). The candidates recommended by the peer review committee are then considered for awards to over 140 different countries, and forwarded for review and selection by the Fulbright Commissions or U.S. Embassies, the U.S. Department of State, and the presidentially appointed Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board.



DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC — In February, the Nicholls Music Department hosted a trumpet masterclass in Danos Theater led by **Aaron Dubois**, Associate Principal Trumpet with the Louisiana Philharmonic. He worked individually with three trumpet players and presented to other brass players.



DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SCIENCES — Deputy Secretary, Otha "Curtis" Nelson, Jr. from the Office of Juvenile Justice shared his expertise and knowledge with Dr. Melinda Jefferson's Juvenile Delinquency course. OJJ serves youth who have been adjudicated delinquent or Families in Need of Services (FINS). They are responsible for youth assigned to their care by the court system, either for supervision or custody in residential placement or secure care. Hosted by the CRJU Club.

It was directed by Assistant Professor Jason Ladd, Department Head Michael Bartnik, Director of Athletic Bands, Ben Robichaux, Assistant Professor Gustavo Miranda, and several current music majors, who taught instrumental masterclasses, music theory, music history, and sight-reading sessions.



DEPARTMENT OF ART – Professor **Deborah Lillie** has had three photographs accepted by a panel of professional photographers for exhibition in the Golden Lens Photography Competition hosted by Bossier Parish Community College Foundation, Shreveport Regional Arts Council, and Prize Foundation.
