

Written in 1941 while Martinique was under Vichy occupation, the play tells the story of the Haitian Revolution's central figure, Toussaint Louverture. The drama remained unknown for many decades until being discovered by Alex Gil, whose translation appears alongside the original French in a new volume from Duke University Press.

Designed to enhance student learning in Mrs. Kortney Granier's ELA classroom, Dr. Busby provided a short talk on the history

of fresco painting in the Renaissance and then students were able to create their own mini fresco paintings with assistance from Kappa Pi members **Nathan Bourgeois**, **Paris Guidry**, **Grace Landry**, and **Madison Rogers**. SCES students also received Renaissance art activity books and build-your-own dome kits to explore Renaissance architecture.







DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC – This year's opera production *Wings Unfolded: The Journey of Opera*, directed by **Dr. Valerie Francis**, took place on May 1st, 3rd, and 4th. For this production, they performed scenes from *Don Giovanni, Die Zauberflöte (The Magic Flute), Cosi fan Tutte* by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart along with Ruggero Leoncavallo's *I Pagliacci*, George Gershwin's *Porgy and Bess*, and Giuseppe Verdi's *Aida*. The opera production continues to nurture creativity, hone musical and theatrical skills, and foster an inclusive spirit from year to year.

Annelle obtained Institutional Review Board approval, gathered over 115 survey responses, and successfully presented her research at the Honors Symposium on April 12th, 2025.



DEPARTMENT OF ART – Dr. Deborah Cibelli, professor of the Department of Art, reviewed the posthumous publication of Erwin Panofsky's thesis, "Michelangelo's Design Principles in Relation to those of Raphael", edited by Gerda Panofsky, for the Spring 2025

issue of the Sixteenth Century Journal: The Journal of Early Modern Studies. This is the official journal of the Sixteenth Century Society published by the University of Chicago. In the review Cibelli noted, "In showing Panofsky's methodological development, dating from his training in Germany during the 1920s, this work enhances our understanding of the theoretical foundations of art history."



DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY & GEOGRAPHY – Laurie Kraus-Landry and her American History Through Architecture students visited Laura Plantation on Friday, February 7th. Students learned about the building materials and techniques used by Creoles in Louisiana. They completed an assignment evaluating how well this historic site matched with the examples surveyed in class.
